


Blazer	Navy with monogram (optional)

Footwear	Black leather lace-up school shoe only (no canvas shoes, sneakers, boots, platforms, high heels, ballet flats or buckles)
Scarf	Navy (Navy or red for Seniors)

School Bag	OLSH backpack, navy with the school monogram



The sports uniform is only worn for PE and Dance lessons and scheduled sporting events. Students need to bring their PE uniform to school to change into. For those students who are participating in Saturday morning sports, a separate uniform is available for purchase or hire through the College.

The uniform, both new and second hand is available from the College Uniform Shop during school terms (9:00am – 12:30pm, Monday - Friday) or via prior arrangement. Uniform items can be purchased via the QKR! App and collected from the College.

2021 NAPLAN



This week at OLSH College all Year 7 and 9 students will sit the National Assessment Program - Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN). NAPLAN is not a test of content. Instead, it tests skills in literacy [reading, writing, language conventions (spelling, grammar and punctuation)] and numeracy that are developed over time through a student's entire schooling. NAPLAN is being held from Tuesday 11 May to Friday 14 May at OLSH College and administered by classroom teachers. OLSH College utilises NAPLAN scores in conjunction with other sources of data collected at the class and school level. We recognise that NAPLAN is only a snapshot of one aspect of our students learning journey. No special preparation is required and we simply advise girls to try their best.

Last year, a Year 8 English class developed a love of all things podcasting during a media study, so much so that they expressed their desire to develop their skills further and create podcasts for the school community. From one discussion and idea, the 'OLSH PodSquad' was formed as a Co-Curricular group.

The group of students from Years 7-10 continue to meet regularly to brainstorm ideas and see what evolves from the process of brainstorming to production. Some spontaneous opportunities to record live podcasts with James Meston from Arch D Radio have been valuable to learn from an industry pro-fessional.

We are delighted that after only 9 months, some students from the group were awarded Most Lis-tened to Podcast of 2020 and nominated for Best Radio Team in the Arch D Radio Awards, with their podcasts listened to in over 50 countries! The PodSquad attended the Arch D Radio & Podcasting ten-year anniversary awards night at the Capri Cinemas on 29 April. It was a 1920s theme, and the cos-tumes were all very impressive! We congratulate Ms Maria Urbano, OLSH College Principal who won best dressed staff member and Lara Nguyen who won best dressed student. We also congratulate the award winning PodSquad students; Riza, Trisha, Diya, Nicole & Lara for this outstanding achievement

This group of promising podcasters have been invited to continue developing their skills in all facets of podcasting from script writing to editing and final production through the 'StartCaster' training offered by James Meston at Arch D radio (1079 Life Radio). The girls will use their new skills to mentor their peers as they lead the OLSH College PodSquad. They are also inadvertently using their skills to support their teachers and enrich the curriculum with podcasts appearing in many subjects as ways to demon-strate learning and outcomes. Next week they will receive their StartCaster badges for completion of the first modules and continue with level 2 in Week 5. In Term 2 they are very excited to be extending the invitation for more students to join the PodSquad and work with them on some exciting projects.

ARE YOU ELIGIBLE FOR SCHOOL CARD IN 2021?

THE ASCENSION – LIVING OUT OUR HIGHEST VALUES

"Why are you standing there looking at the sky?" This is the question asked by "two men in white garments" who were found to be suddenly standing beside the disciples as they watched Jesus ascend into heaven. It seems almost comical, you could imagine that the most obvious answer would be another question; "Do you regularly see people whisked up to heaven?" (perhaps quickly followed by: Who are you and where did you come from?). But here at the beginning of the life of the Church we see the dichotomy which defines all that we do. On the one hand we are people with gazes fixed towards heaven, towards those things beyond our sight. Whilst on the other we, like the disciples, hear the challenge, "why are you standing there looking at the sky?" Our mission is here, to be carried out in the concreteness of everyday life.

The heavens into which Jesus ascends in this story in part signify the highest ideals towards which we strive, the values around which our lives are built. However, we are not called to just stand around gazing heavenward, to simply contemplate these transcendent realities. Our calling is to instantiate them into the everyday life. This is the core mission of the Church, but in a particular way for us it is also the core mission of education. Education must be about more than simply preparing for the work force, and even becoming a well-rounded person, it should be concerned with the highest ideals; truth, beauty, and goodness.

It is important then that we find balance between giving attention to the ideals that motivate us and to the concrete particularities of our everyday attempts to live them out. We engage in the first part of this process when we seek to reflect upon and articulate our values, for instance in our School Pillars or even the broader Live, Learn, Lead Framework that underpins Catholic Education. It then comes down to the concrete realities of everyday school life where we are called to live these values out, to make them real. This is a constant and ongoing process, but it is comforting to be reminded that since the beginning of the Church's life on the day of The Ascension we were promised that we would not be alone in it, the Spirit will gently guide us.

And so, as we celebrate The Ascension, we as a school are reminded to contemplate our values and to find new opportunities to live them out, but this is also true for each of us as individuals. We should take a moment then to truly consider:

What ideals motivate me, what values lie at the heart of who I am?

How can I strive to better live out these values in the concreteness of my day to day life?

END TRACHOMA PROJECT - YEAR 9 TEXTILES TECHNOLOGY



Did you know that Trachoma is the leading cause of infectious blindness in the world and is completely preventable? In Australia, Trachoma remains endemic in a relatively small number of remote Aboriginal communities in the Northern Territory, South Australia and Western Australia. Hygiene and washing are essential to eye health and eliminating Trachoma.

In Term 1, students in 9 Gold have been looking at the eye disease, Trachoma with the hope to support this project and live out our College Pillar to Touch the Hearts of Others, and championing the poor and marginalised just as Jesus would have.

They collaborated with Salisbury City Rotaract Club to support End Trachoma's 2000 Toiletry Bags for 2000 Primary School Students in the Northern Territory. The team provided 50 of these kits that are essential for eliminating Trachoma. *End Trachoma* is an initiative by the Rotary Districts of Australia that supports the building of healthy communities.

The students from OLSH supported through putting their sewing knowledge and skills to use in planning, preparing, and creating drawstring bags that Salisbury City Rotaract Club will fill with essential hygiene and toiletry products. These Toiletry Kits will be delivered to the Ampilatwatja School in Alice Springs.
