From the Principal



Dear Parents / Guardians, Friends, Staff and Students of OLSH College,

Welcome to the new year

Let me begin by welcoming everyone to Our Lady of the Sacred Heart College (aka OLSH or OLSH College) for a new school year. I especially extend a warm welcome to new families and staff who are joining us this year. It is certainly an exciting new beginning for our newest members, Year 7 students and also to the new students across other year levels. We are delighted to formally welcome them into the College as OLSH students (now affectionately known as OLSHies). I trust that they are already feeling at home and have enjoyed their first days at the College.

The start to the year commenced with the Year 7 and Year 12 girls being at school on Monday 29 January. This induction day is important as it sets the scene for the year.

Year 7 students have and will continue to spend a significant period of time over these first few days in 'O Week' (aka Orientation Week). The week is an extension of the transition program which commenced last year in Term 3 and aims to support your daughters transition to secondary school. This special Mass allowed us to come together as part of the Chevalier Family and the Community of the Daughters of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart, honouring these significant milestones in our history, our connection, and acknowledging 150 years of the Daughters of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart, and 200 year anniversary of Father Chevalier's birthday (15 March 2024). We recognise how blessed we are that our OLSH College Communities have flourished through the years. Mass was followed by a shared morning tea and tour of the Hartzer Building.

The College's learning management system, SEQTA Engage is designed specially to manage and maintain student information i.e. timetabling, reports, personal information. SEQTA is an online Teaching & Learning Management system that helps to connect families with their daughter's learning.

On the SEQTA App you will be able to see your daughter's timetable, homework, lesson information, upcoming assessments and results. When students commence at the College, parents/guardians will be sent an email to set up their SEQTA account. Please refer to the SEQTA ENGAGE parent handbook for further instructions. Parents of students in Years 8 to 12 should already have their login details. All new families and parents will receive their link and password in due course. SEQTA Engage can be accessed via the SEQTA quick link on our website and on the College App.

Parents who have forgotten their SEQTA-Engage login details are asked to contact the College.

In addition, the SEQTA App is designed to allow parents/guardians, teachers and students to access important information about events and daily activities at the College. The SEQTA App is updated regularly to ensure that the College community is able to keep their fingers on the pulse of the school.



IMPORTANT REMINDERS ABOUT STUDENT ATTENDANCE

All students are required to be at school from 8:40am. School finishes at 3:25pm (except for Tuesdays when school concludes at 2:05pm).

Attendance at school is essential for students to not only pursue excellence with their studies but also reverence relationships and feel a part of the school community. We remind students that they are full time students so must make attendance a priority.

Where sickness or other significant matters lead to a student running late or prevents a student from attending, parents/guardians are asked to inform the school via telephone on 8269 8800 or email olsh@olsh.catholic.edu.au by 9:15am on the day. A note in the student's diary upon their return, which explains the absence is expected. A medical certificate is required for absences of more than two consecutive days due to illness.

If students are absent or late to school when the class rolls are taken and the College has not received a message from the parents/guardians, the College will automatically contact the parents/guardians via a SMS message to their mobile phone from 9:30am. The message will arrive on the phone of parent/guardian (number 1). The number you receive the SMS from will vary each day so please do not store any of these numbers in your phone.

Parents/guardians are requested to reply to the College as soon as possible using SMS reply or phoning the school office direct on 8269 8800. When replying via SMS, parents should always include their daughter's name and home class in the message and the reason for the absence.

Any unexplained absences will also appear in the dashboard on SEQTA ENGAGE and families should regularly check this to ensure information is up to date.

Families should advise the College of any changes to mobile phone numbers as soon as possible, to ensure our records are accurate and notifications of absence are being received. If parents/guardians do not have a mobile number, it is advisable to provide the number of an older sibling, grandparent or relative who may receive the SMS on your behalf (please return a signed written note via your daughter with the mobile number to use and the name and relationship of the person nominated).

Where possible, dental/medical appointments should be made after school or during the school holidays. It is important not to disrupt the learning process for students. If a student needs to leave the school grounds for an appointment, the school requires 24 hours' notice by either a note in your daughter's diary, written by a parent/guardian or email to the College. The student will have the note initialled by her lesson teacher at that leaving time and then report to the Front Office to sign out. The student is then able to leave for her appointment.

Where absences must occur due to family circumstances or special opportunities arise that would be beneficial to the student, parents are to write to the Principal advising of the matter with details and reasons. Parents should note that work deadlines, preorganised subject tests and examination time frames will not be modified for such student absences other than in very exceptional circumstances and as negotiated with the Principal and the relevant teachers. We invite students (possibly parents) to contact class teachers to organise work for students who are ill or away for any length of time.

In instances when a senior student is absent from school for more than 2 weeks, this may seriously affect their learning program which may need to be adjusted significantly.

During the day students should not contact their parents directly via mobile phone without first notifying the Front Office.

For those new families unfamiliar with the history of our school, Our Lady of the Sacred Heart (OLSH) College was established in 1951 in South Australia by the Daughters of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart, members of a religious congregation founded by Father Jules Chevalier in France in 1874. The

congregation also established a number of primary schools in Adelaide including Immaculate Heart of Mary (Brompton), St Brigid's School (Kilburn), St Gabriel's School (Enfield) and St Martin's Catholic Primary School (Greenarces). There are only three OLSH secondary schools across Australia one in Victoria (Bentleigh) and one in NSW (Kensington) and the three secondary schools keep in close communication to keep the legacy of the Daughters of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart and the charism of the Spirituality of the Heart alive.

Our Motto: May the Sacred Heart of Jesus be Everywhere Loved. All who belong to the family of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart are called to live out this motto. It is to live the very life of Jesus... to be on earth the Heart of Christ!

Jewellery

Students may wear the following jewellery:

- 2 plain earrings in each ear
- 1 simple ring on each hand
- 1 watch
- a chain may be worn under the uniform out of sight
- medic alert bracelet or any other medical item

Body jewellery such as nose studs, eyebrow or tongue studs are not acceptable. Any facial piercings that cannot be removed must be covered with a band aid or a clear stud only.

Hair, Nails & Cosmetics

Shoulder length hair (or longer) is to be kept away from the face and always tied back with a red ribbon. No unnatural hair colour or streaks are permitted eg. Purple, blue or green etc.

Fake nails, eyelash extensions, mascara, nail polish and other make-up is not to be worn at school. If students are found to be wearing; makeup, fake nails, nail polish, eyelash extensions or facial piercings, they will be asked to remove it immediately.

All students are able to wear their sports uniform on days they have PE or dance lessons or for excursions where permitted. Please note: The mixing of formal uniform (Summer or Winter) or casual/leisure attire with the PE uniform is not acceptable. Formal school uniform will be expected at particular school events should students be the recipient of an award, recognised in some way or addressing the student body.

For those students who are participating in Saturday morning sports, a separate uniform is available to purchase.
